

**CITY OF SCHULENBURG
SCHULENBURG, TX
October 20, 2025**

The City Council of the City of Schulenburg met in regular session on Monday, October 20, 2025, at 6:30 P.M. in the Council Chambers located at 607 Upton Avenue, Schulenburg, Texas. The elected officials present included Mayor, Connie Koopmann, Alderwoman, Kathy Kleiber, Aldermen, Greg Thomas, Frank Wick III, Roger Moellenberndt, and Clarence Ahlschlager. City staff present included City Administrator, Tami Walker, Police Sergeant , Terry "Rusty" Roggenkamp, Public Works Director, Darryl Moeller, and City Secretary, Mason Florus.

Visitors included Darrell Vyvjala of the Schulenburg Sticker, Michael Ohnheiser, Brian Lux, and Jeanine Ulrich

Mayor Koopmann called role. Mason Florus said a prayer over the meeting and its members. Mayor Koopmann led the Pledge of Allegiance and the Texas Pledge.

Under Presentations by Citizens, Michael Ohnheiser addressed Council. Mr. Ohnheiser stated that he has a water leak at his house and he does not feel that it's right that he has to pull a permit to repair an existing waterline.

Under Presentations by Citizens, Brian Lux addressed Council. Mr. Lux claimed that while driving into Schulenburg, a City vehicle was driving unsafe and at excessive speeds. He asked the City to look into the matter.

Alderman Wick made a motion, seconded by Alderman Thomas, to accept Consent Agenda Items A and B. The motion passed unanimously.

Mrs. Walker led discussion on a Pole Attachment Agreement between Frontier and the City of Schulenburg.

Mrs. Walker reminded Council that Frontier was at the last Council Meeting and gave a presentation on their new fiber installation project. As a result, a pole attachment agreement had to be updated.

Mrs. Walker elaborated that this agreement has taken about two months going between the City's legal and Frontier's attorneys to work out the best solutions for both sides. Frontier has already signed the agreement, and once the City signs, Frontier will run an inventory of poles because the agreement spells out that the City will receive \$9.46 per attachment.

Alderman Moellenberndt made a motion, seconded by Alderwoman Kleiber, to accept the agreement. The motion passed unanimously.

Under Mayor Comments, Mayor Koopmann wanted to congratulate the Police Department on a successful National Night Out. She stated she received a lot of positive comments and she's looking forward to it being bigger and better next year.

Mayor also mentioned that she was invited and attended a meeting on mental health in La Grange. She also shared Governor Abbott's proclamation on the wildfire danger and advised citizens to adhere to the burn ban.

Alderwoman Kleiber echoed the Mayor's comments on the National Night Out, and called it a great event.

Public Works Director, Darryl Moeller's, report was included in Council's Packet.

City Administrator, Tami Walker, reported the following to Council:

- On October 8th, Darryl and Daniel attended MASA in Bastrop, it's a meeting with several electric providers. Also attended the National Night Out and it was a great event.
- City Offices were closed on the 13th for Columbus Day.
- On October 15th, attended an EDC Meeting, they agreed to fund part of the College St. Project
- October 16th, attended the State of the LCRA in Seguin
- City Wide Clean Up began this past Saturday. It will continue this Wednesday and Saturday.
- Reminder that the City was awarded \$3.89 Million in GLO funds for a drainage project. Darryl and I have been attending monthly web meetings. Today, GLO staff was on site doing an audit.
- October 28-31, Myself, Chief, and Mason will be attending the TML Conference in Fort Worth.
- PGAL is going to be in town tomorrow conducting a pre bid meeting. The bid was in last week's Sticker, will be in this week's paper, and is also on the City's Website, and CIVCAST.

Mrs. Walker stated that City Staff has been issuing letters to some residents who have galvanized water lines past the City Meter because there is an increased risk of lead contaminating the customers' drinking water.

The City cannot force residents to replumb their homes, but they are required by law to notify citizens of the potential risks.

Mrs. Walker commented on Mr. Lux's claim stating that if a City employee was driving reckless, it is "unacceptable" and she will investigate and address the matter.

Lastly, Mrs. Walker reminded Council and citizens that the Community Meeting for the Parks and Rec. will be this Wednesday at 5:30 at the Council Chambers. She is hoping for a large

turnout with valuable community input. 300 responses have been received from the surveys and hot dogs will be provided at the meeting.

Alderman Wick asked if the City Vehicles had GPS tracking systems. Mrs. Walker replied, no.

Alderman Moellenberndt inquired if there was a timeline for the completion of the College St. Project. Mrs. Walker answered that they are supposed to have everything paved by Thanksgiving.

Mayor Koopmann asked if PIKE is removing the old poles. Moeller replied that there are still communication wires on the old poles. Once the communication companies move their lines from the old poles to the new ones, the City will remove the old poles.

Alderwoman Kleiber asked if the results for the testing of City Hall and the Police Department were available. Mrs. Walker answered that PGAL has not shared those results yet. She believes they are waiting for the bid packages to come in.

Alderman Ahlschlager made a motion, seconded by Alderman Moellenberndt, to adjourn the meeting at 6:51. The motion passed unanimously.
